UNSECURED PERSONAL PROPERTY TAXES DUE AUGUST 31, 2021

Annual bills for Sacramento County unsecured personal property taxes for fiscal year 2021-2022 were mailed out on July 16, 2021, and are payable without penalties through August 31, 2021.

Tax notices for property such as business property, business fixtures, boats, and aircraft are mailed to owners of unsecured property in July of each year. If you do not receive a tax bill by August 7, 2021, please contact the Sacramento County Tax Collector's Unsecured Property Tax Unit at (916) 874-7833, between the hours of 9am and 4pm, Monday through Friday (excluding holidays).

Nonreceipt of a Tax Bill Does Not Excuse Delinquency or Allow the Tax Collector to Cancel Penalties or Collection Costs.

Tax bills become delinquent if not paid in the Tax Collector's Office by 5 p.m. on August 31, 2021, or received by mail bearing a postmark of August 31, 2021.

If a tax bill is not paid by the delinquency date, a 10 percent penalty and collection cost will be added. DMV registration may be withheld on watercraft if unsecured property taxes are reported delinquent. If a tax bill remains unpaid after October 31, 2021, additional collection costs and monthly penalties at the rate of 1.5 percent will be added to the base tax.

Payments may be made by mail or in person at the County Tax Collector's Office located at 700 "H" Street, Room 1710, Sacramento, CA 95814, between the hours of 8am and 5pm, Monday - Friday, holidays excluded. DISTRICT MASTER PLAN UPDATE

Parks are invaluable for our overall quality of life, and the Carmichael Recreation and Park District wants to hear from you! The District is preparing a Recreation and Parks Master Plan Update and is asking community members to provide input.

A recreation and parks master plan is a strategic document that serves as a guide for many policy decisions: prioritizing and balancing demands and opportunities, providing a framework for park and facility improvements and other expenditures, and improving park and recreational activities.

This update will collect and analyze data regarding the state of current conditions, evolving demographics, and emerging needs in order to develop recommendations to improve, protect, and expand the District's network of parks and recreational services for the future.

The Master Plan will provide a long-term vision for the District's park system and establish a framework to allow the District to respond to new opportunities while ensuring that adequate parks, facilities, and recreation programs meet the needs of the District's future residents, employees and visitors.

SACRAMENTO AREA SEWER DISTRICT AND SUMMER PESTS

The Sacramento Area Sewer District (SASD) has seen an increase in customer calls about cockroaches in and around their sewer pipes and access points. Pests are drawn to damp, dark spaces, including crawl spaces, storm drains, and pipes, because they provide a source of water and food. During dry conditions—like Sacramento summers—these pests seek water sources and shelter. Each summer, SASD receives increased calls from concerned citizens about cockroaches in the sewer system.

SASD owns and operates 4,600 miles of sewer pipelines, including 67,000 sewer manholes. Over the years, SASD has used several control methods to address customer concerns and discourage cockroaches from inhabiting the sewer system. If you experience pests in or around SASD pipes or access points, workers will come investigate and use a number of proactive and reactive measures to mitigate the issue. If necessary, SASD will schedule pest control treatment of the pipes by a qualified pest control specialists.



NORTH HIGHLANDS
RECREATION AND PARK
DISTRICT RECOGNIZED

Earlier this year, the California Association of Recreation and Parks Districts (CARPD) Board of Directors selected the North Highlands Recreation and Park District to receive a 2021 Award for Excellence in the Field of Recreation and Parks. In May 2021, the North Highlands Recreation and Parks District received notification that they were selected to receive the CARPD Award of Distinction for "Outstanding Innovation" for its Distance Learning Program.

Like many districts, the North Highlands Recreation and Park District closed its offices, cancelled its recreation programs, activities, services, and rentals in March 2020 due to the Covid-19 pandemic. With local school districts struggling to find an education model that would help meet the needs of its students in the North Highlands community, the NHRPD staff, specifically **Sarah Musser and Rachel Robertson**, proposed an idea of partnering with the Twin Rivers Unified School District (TRUSD) by offering a Distance Learning Program at the NHRPD's community center. The goal was to provide an in-person program to the most impacted students in our community: homeless, foster youth, students of single low income parents, and children of essential workers.

This effort resulted in a fully subsidized, full day school support program for students that did not have resources to be successful under an "at home" distance learning program model. The NHRPD and TRUSD pilot program has proved so successful and was so well received that the school district used the model to find other partners in the community and expand the program.

NHRPD staff were also able to enlist support from the school district's nutrition services department to provide daily breakfast, lunch, and dinner for each student, as well as fresh produce bags to take home to their families. Over the course of this nearly twelve month program, additional services have been added to support students in other areas of their lives such as fire safety demonstrations, local law enforcement presentations, STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) presentations, and holiday celebrations.

Congratulations, and thank you to the North Highlands Recreation and Park District for creating a model program that helped so many people during the pandemic

SAFE SWIMMING POOL TIPS FOR FAMILIES

Summertime is synonymous with swimming, especially in the Sacramento summer heat. As families enjoy gatherings and newly-opened swimming pools, Sacramento County Public Health reminds parents and caregivers to practice water safety tips in and around pools.

In Sacramento County, **70 percent of drowning deaths occurred in children under the age of five**, according to the Safe Kids Program of Greater Sacramento. Drowning is the leading injury-related cause of death for children ages 1-4, and many of those deaths occurred in backyard pools or spas. Even inflatable pools can be dangerous for children.

Here are a few tips to keep children safe around pools:

- Watch your children at all times or designate an official Water Watcher who can swim to monitor children in or around the pool. This should be an adult who is 18 years old or older. Their ONLY job is to supervise children in the water – they should not be reading, texting or playing games on their phone.
- Teach children to stay away from drains in pools and spas
- Ensure all pools and spas both in a backyard and any public pool you may visit - have drain covers
- Keep a phone nearby for use in an emergency
- Enroll your children in swimming and water safety lessons
- · Learn infant and adult CPR
- If a child is missing, check the pool/spa first
- Own a pool? Install proper child-proof barriers, covers and alarms on and around your pool and spa
- Remove ladders for above ground pools when not in use




CANINE COMFORT AT SMF

DON'T FLUSH YOUR MEDS

Help us prevent the misuse of medications and keep them from entering our waterways. Flushing unused or expired prescription and over-the-counter medications down the sink or toilet can pollute the environment. Look for a medication collection bin at your local pharmacy, medical provider, or law enforcement office. Please keep these tips in mind:

- Dispose of unused prescription and over-thecounter medications responsibly
- Prior to drop-off, remove pills from containers and put in a clear zipper bag. Keep medicated liquids and creams in original containers.
- Recycle your empty containers, but first scratch off or black out personal information.
- Find a medication collection bin near you and place zipper bags, liquids, and creams in the bin.

The American and Sacramento rivers are the lifeblood of Sacramento and home to abundant wildlife as well as fun and refreshing activities. The rivers are beautiful, but cold water, swift currents and under water hazards make them dangerous, even for strong swimmers. Make sure your little ones are in the best of hands by strapping them into a certified lifejacket. It's the law for kids under 13! The California Division of Boating and Waterways life vest loaner program provides more than 2,000 new life vests a year. They are easily accessible for children, and they are free. You can borrow a life vest at one of the many borrowing stations along Sacramento's public waterways.
