SEVERE WEATHER COOLING CENTERS AND SHELTERING

Due to high daytime temperatures this weekend and into next week, the Sacramento County Department of Human Assistance has opened the offices listed below to serve as Cooling Centers for the community from Thursday, September 1, through Wednesday, September 7. All community members are welcome. Protective facial coverings are required and will be provided to all visitors. Pets must be on a leash or contained in an animal carrier at all times. Snacks and water will be provided.

In addition, DHA initiated outreach for Weather Respite Motel Sheltering with check-in starting on August 31, and a tentative check-out on Thursday, September 8. Respite motel sheltering will follow the same process we used during previous weather events. Navigators will make contact with those experiencing homelessness to offer a motel stay and will assist in reserving a space at the motel. Participants in the weather respite sheltering program will work with their referring party on transportation to and from the motel and are allowed to bring partners, pets, and a limited number of possessions with them for the duration of their stay.

TIPS FOR STAYING COOL

Sacramento County Public Health reminds residents to take steps to keep cool during the upcoming heat event. With the seasonably high temperatures expected, it is important that you take precautionary steps to keep yourself, your family, your neighbors and your pets cool, and remember to check on seniors and those with mobility issues at least twice a day.

To keep as cool and hydrated as possible, drink plenty of water, avoid spending time outside, especially during the hottest part of the day, and limit outside activities as much as


possible. Cooling down a few hours a day will allow the body to recover and tolerate the heat better for the rest of the day.

Tips for Beating the Heat:

- **Stay hydrated** Drink plenty of cool water. Avoid alcohol. Avoid hot, heavy meals.
- Limit sun exposure— When possible, stay in air conditioning on hot days. If you don't have air conditioning, take cool showers or freeze a wet cloth to wipe down your head and neck.
- Check on loved ones

 Be sure to check on less mobile or older friends, family and neighbors who live alone, don't have air conditioning or are hesitant to use their air conditioner.
- Clothing- Wear lightweight, light-colored and loosefitting clothing
- Avoid the hottest part of the day If you have to be outside, try to stick to the cooler morning and evening hours. Wear light, loose clothing and take frequent, shaded or air-conditioned breaks. Do not exercise outside during the hottest part of the day.
- Beware of hot cars Never leave a person or a pet in a parked car, even for a short time. On a mild 80degree day, the temperature inside a car can reach 100-degrees in fewer than 10 minutes.
- Keep your pets cool Give your pets plenty of fresh, clean water. Don't exercise your pets in high temperatures or when the pavement is hot. Make sure they have a shady place to get out of the sun or bring them indoors.
- **Sunscreen** Protect your skin against cancer, burns and skin damage by using SPF 30 or higher.
- **Stay informed** Watch your local weather forecasts so you can plan outdoor activities safely and pay attention to any extreme heat alerts.

Don't get caught unprepared as temperatures climb into the triple digits. Be aware of the signs and symptoms of heat-related illness and learn to respond if you or a loved one are experiencing severe heat-related illness by checking out our Hot Weather Tips news release.



SACRAMENTO COUNTY SECURES \$5.5 MILLION FOR CHP SPECIAL ENFORCEMENT UNIT

We have all seen an increase in reckless driving and vehicle "sideshow" activity in our neighborhoods and parking lots over the last several years, resulting in severe noise disturbances and property damage. As you may know, the California Highway Patrol (CHP) has the primary responsibility for enforcing traffic laws on our roads in the unincorporated areas. Most CHP patrols in District 3 are handled by the North Sacramento CHP office at 5109 Tyler Street in Old Foothill Farms.

Because sideshows have continued to cause problems for residents and businesses throughout District 3, I reached out to our California Legislature to increase the CHP's funding to combat this illegal activity. **Assemblymember Jim Cooper** placed a request in the recent 2022-23 budget for the CHP's sideshow taskforce activities, and the CHP will now receive a one-time \$5.5 million to continue to address sideshow activity.

The funding will support the CHP's Special Enforcement Unit (SEU), consisting of a team of officers who will conduct specialized enforcement in different areas of the community. They will be targeting speeding, driving under the influence, and aggressive driving. A recent SEU effort in the area of El Camino and Eastern Avenues in Arden Arcade resulted in numerous enforcement actions and public education. Additional SEU efforts are scheduled in the coming weeks and months on roadways with the highest volume of traffic concerns.

As a former CHP Chief, I know the increased State funding and increased presence in our neighborhoods will have a positive impact on traffic safety.

NEW INSPECTOR GENERAL APPOINTED

The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously in August to appoint **Francine Tournour** as the new **Inspector General for Sacramento County**. Tourneur will begin serving her contract term from September 1, 2022, to August 31, 2023, with the option to renew the agreement for two additional one-year terms.

Francine Tournour was selected as the best and most qualified candidate following a nationwide recruitment search. Tournour began her career in law enforcement as a Deputy Sheriff in Contra Costa County, where she quickly gained an appreciation for the complex field of law enforcement. After working in law enforcement for a brief period, she began working for the City of Sacramento as a Deputy Director for the Office of Public Safety and Accountability.

In 2008, she was promoted to the Director of that office, where she was responsible for conducting complex and sensitive investigations relating to law enforcement practices and incidents. Tournour has a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice from Madonna University and a master's degree in Emergency Management from California State University, Long Beach.

The Inspector General is responsible for ensuring the integrity of the citizen complaint process and thoroughness and fairness of related Sheriff's Office investigations while building positive relations with the community. The Inspector General works independently of the Sheriff and presents recommendations relating to Sheriff operations to the Board of Supervisors, County Executive, and the Sheriff.



DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S YOUTH ACADEMY


The Sacramento County District Attorney's Office is now recruiting students who want to learn about the criminal justice system, hear from our criminal justice partners, and engage in open communication with law enforcement about issues that affect young people. The District Attorney Youth Academy is a partnership between the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department, Sacramento Police Department, Sacramento County Probation Department, Sacramento County Public Defender's Office, Rancho Cordova Police Department, Elk Grove Police Department, and the Galt Police Department.

Students will be educated on topics such as **gun violence**, **gangs**, **social media and cybercrimes**, **dating violence**, **human trafficking**, **and distracted driving**. The program is open to current Sacramento County high school students. Attendees must submit a completed application, signed permission slip, and signed Code of Conduct agreement. Space is limited, so sign up early!

The District Attorney's "Virtual" Youth Academy classes will be held every Thursday in the evenings from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. via Zoom from September 29, 2022, through December 15, 2022, with an in-person graduation ceremony on the last day. 
